# City of Riverside, Ohio A Proclamation Recognizing

# National Fire Prevention Month – October 2022

Whereas, the City of Riverside is committed to ensuring the safety and security of all those living in and visiting our city;

Whereas, fire is a serious public safety concern both locally and nationally, and homes are the locations where people are at greatest risk from fire; and

Whereas, home fires caused 2,580 civilian deaths in the United States in 2020, according to the National Fire Protection Association® (NFPA®), and fire departments in the United States responded to 356,500 home fires; and Whereas, smoke alarms sense smoke well before you can, alerting you to danger in the event of fire in which you may have as little as two minutes to escape safely, and working smoke alarms cut the risk of dying in reported home fires in half; and Whereas, Riverside residents that are responsive to public education measures are better able to take personal steps to increase their safety from fire, especially in their homes, and residents who have planned and practiced a home fire escape plan are more prepared and will therefore be more likely to survive a fire; and

Whereas, Riverside first responders are dedicated to reducing the occurrence of home fires and home fire injuries through prevention and protection education; and Whereas, the 2022 Fire Prevention Week™ theme, "Fire won't wait. Plan your escape.™," effectively serves to remind Riverside residents it is important to have a home fire escape plan. Now, Therefore, I, Peter J. Williams, Mayor of the City of Riverside, Ohio and the City Council do hereby proclaim October 2022, as Fire Prevention Month, and I urge all residents to plan and practice a home fire escape for Fire Prevention Month and to support the many public safety activities and efforts of Riverside fire and emergency services

## MINUTES

**CALL TO ORDER:** Mayor Williams called the Riverside, Ohio City Council Meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. at the Riverside Administrative Offices located at 5200 Springfield Street, Suite 100, Riverside, Ohio, 45431.

**ROLL CALL:** Council attendance was as follows: Mr. Denning, present; Mrs. Franklin, present; Ms. Fry, present; Mr. Joseph, present; Ms. Lommatzsch, present; Mr. Maxfield, present; and Mayor Williams, present.

Staff present was as follows: Josh Rauch, City Manager; Frank Robinson, Police Chief; Dan Stitzel, Fire Chief; Kathy Bartlett, Public Service Director; Dalma Grandjean, Law Director; and Katie Lewallen, Clerk of Council.

**EXCUSE ABSENT MEMBERS:** No council members were absent.

**ADDITIONS OR CORRECTIONS TO AGENDA:** No changes were made to the agenda.

**APPROVAL OF AGENDA:** Mr. Denning moved, seconded by Ms. Lommatzsch, to approve the agenda. All were in favor. **Motion carried**.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE: Mayor Williams led the pledge of allegiance.

**PROCLAMATION:** Mayor Williams read a proclamation recognizing 9/11 Day encouraging all citizens to honor the lives of those lost on September 11, 2001, by participating in community service and remembrance ceremonies on that day and throughout the year.

**MINUTES:** Mr. Denning moved, seconded by Mr. Joseph, to approve the minutes of the August 11, 2022, council work session, August 13, 2022, council strategic planning session, and the August 18, 2022, council business meeting. All were in favor. **Motion carried.** 

**LIQUOR LICENSE:** City council had no objection to the change of corporate stock ownership of Yum Yums Drive Thru, 635 Spinning Road, Riverside, OH 45431.

**WRITTEN CITIZEN PETITIONS:** Mayor Williams stated any citizen wishing to speak should fill out a petition found at the back of the room and turn it in to the clerk.

### **DEPARTMENT UPDATES:**

A) Police Department – Chief Robinson stated they currently have four officers out. Officer Josh Schmidt, who also works as the IT for the department has recently attended updated training and advanced computer forensic training provided at no charge by the federal government. Officer Matt Jackson, a K-9 officer and member of the S.W.A.T. team, has been offered some leadership training through the county with regard to his position with the S.W.A.T. team. Chief Robinson stated they started the process for hiring police officers; he added that a lot of places are hiring right now, and it is hard to get new recruits at present. Eight candidates passed the test. He added they have started the security process that they

do with the schools at the beginning of each school year. They will be participating in the job shadow day at Carroll High School. Last year, they had four job shadow, and he believes they will have four again this year. This past week, they participated in a triple OVI checkpoint through the Montgomery County combined A-Z OVI task force. He stated that Tina went through some training last week and lost a tooth; one of her canines were ripped out. She underwent surgery to fix the broken tooth and a dangling tonsil. She is expected to have a full recovery. He showed council the new radios the department has received and thanked council for being able to purchase them for the police department.

- B) Fire Department Chief Stitzel stated they are continuing their transition over to Image Trend and getting their data out of current RMS and predicting to go live on October 11, 2022. Huber Heights plans to go live with their new software on the same date. Both police and fire have been involved in several meetings to get ready for that date. There will be a lot of training in the weeks prior to make sure it is working functionally before the switch. They did their insurance services review on Wednesday; it went well and received a lot of good comments about the department and their documentation and records. They will not know their rating for another four to six months but think it will remain a "3" or a much stronger "3". He stated that he is losing a full-time firefighter who is moving to Memphis, Tennessee as he wants to be a big city firefighter. They are going through the hiring process and reviewing the applications they have now. He was on a national webinar today for firefighter recruitment and retention because it is a national problem. Everyone is struggling to get firefighters, paramedics, and police officers.
- C) Public Service Department Ms. Bartlett stated her department is gearing up for the Harshman Wall repair, which will begin September 12, 2022. The project will overlap the West Springfield project for about six weeks. That entire area will be very busy. Both contractors are aware of each other working. A press release will go out next week along with changeable message signs to let people know of the construction. Smithville Road can be used as an alternative route. She stated that she and the city manager met with all the schools in the city to discuss city road projects and anything else they had on their minds. They got good ideas on how to better communicate with them on projects. She met with the chiefs regarding the road projects as well. The crews are ready to do the crack sealing and sealant next week. They will do the paths and the basketball courts.
- **D)** City Manager Report Mr. Rauch reminded council that next week's work session has been rescheduled to September 22, 2002. One item he needed to mention is an upcoming change to the Table of Organization. He would like to create an additional police officer position to backfill for when the School Resource Officer is appointed, and then he would like to remove the engineering technician position and reclassify it into another maintenance worker position. He stated if there are no objections, then he can bring the ordinance in September having a second reading in October.

**PUBLIC COMMENT ON AGENDA ITEMS:** Mrs. Sue Held came forward to comment on the proclamation. Mrs. Sue Held, 6005 Seagate Place, shared the story of her little brother, who died on September 11, 2001. She stated that her brother, Chuck Jones, was born on November 8, 1952, in Clinton, Indiana. He earned a Bachelor of Science degree in

astronautical engineering from the United States Air Force Academy. He received his Master of Science degree in astronautics from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. He entered the USAF manned space flight engineer program in 1982. He was scheduled on mission STS 71B in December 1986, but the mission was canceled after the Challenger disaster in January of 1986. He left the program and later worked for Bowling Air Force Base in Washington, D.C. He was the systems program director for intelligence and information systems at Hanscom Air Force Base in Massachusetts. He was killed at the age of 48 on September 11, 2001, aboard American Airlines Flight 11. He had been living as a retired USAF Colonel in Bedford, Massachusetts. He is survived by his wife Jeanette. She thanked council for the proclamation. Mayor Williams thanked her for sharing his story.

Mr. Rauch stated this is a new section regarding fire hydrants.

Deputy Mayor Denning moved, seconded by Mr. Joseph, to approve the second reading of Ordinance No. 22-O-805. The clerk read the ordinance by title only.

Mayor Williams opened the public hearing at 6:19 pm. No one came forward. Mayor Williams closed the public hearing at 6:19 pm.

Deputy Mayor Denning moved, seconded by Mrs. Franklin, to approve the first reading of Ordinance No. 22-O-806. The clerk read the ordinance by title only.

Roll call went as follows: Mr. Denning, yes; Mrs. Franklin, yes; Ms. Fry; Mr. Joseph, yes; Ms. Lommatzsch, yes; Mr. Maxfield, yes; and Mayor Williams, yes. **Motion carried.** 

### **B. RESOLUTIONS**

I) Resolution No. 22-R-2788 – A resolution amending Resolution No. 21-R-2720 authorizing the city manager to enter into a professional service agreement with the Montgomery County Transportation Improvement District (TID) to provide project management and financing services for the Harshman Realignment Project – Woodman Phase 4.

Ms. Lommatzsch moved, seconded by Deputy Mayor Denning, to approve Resolution No. 22-R-2788.

All were in favor. Motion carried.

II) Resolution No. 22-R-2789 - A resolution authorizing the city manager to make application to the U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT) for the purpose of obtaining a Safe Streets for All (SS4A) Grant for the Woodman Corridor Study Project.

Deputy Mayor Denning moved, seconded by Mr. Maxfield, to approve Resolution No. 22-R-2789.

All were in favor. Motion carried.

PUBLIC COMMENT ON NON-AGENDA ITEMS: Mayor Williams stated there were two petitions to speak on non-agenda items. He invited James and Sarah DesLauriers to the podium and asked them to state their name, address, and keep comments to three minutes. Mr. James DesLauriers, 310 Spinning Road, stated he came tonight for clarification on ordinances related to chickens in residential areas. He stated he pulled three documents from Municode and they did not state anything within a zone with any zone attached to it. They found another one that had to do with accessory buildings as far as allowing them to raise chickens in an R-1 zone, which is what he believes they are in. He stated they were cited by the City for a zoning violation in which they were not allowed to have the chickens. It was much harder to find the zoning code than it was the other two that somewhat specified that they would be able to have them. He wanted to get clarification. They have had their chickens for a little while; they did not know they were in any violation of code. They have never been a problem; they are not a nuisance. They keep everything very clean. They have been a benefit to the community and to their child, who has an autoimmune disease. Through the pandemic, they have served as a great social tool as their child is very introverted, and he is coming out of his shell quite a bit. He would much gladly spend time with the chickens than play video games. He just wants clarification if they can have them or not. Mr. Rauch stated he is happy to meet with them after the meeting. His understanding is that they have to be on at least an acre-and-a-half lot for chickens and have a conditional use.

Mayor Williams invited Mr. Frank Smith to the podium. He asked him to state his name, address, and keep comments to three minutes. Mr. Frank Smith, 4703 Byesville Blvd., stated, number one, he wanted to know they can't get Jerry to spray the lot. He knows that he can spray water on it to control the dust. Number two, he still wants the sign. He is tired of fighting with the trucks. Number three, he wants the other mess cleaned up. Zoning said they would be there on the 30<sup>th</sup> to clean it up and it is still there. He is still stealing electricity; he is still relieving himself off the front porch. There are kids who do not need to be seeing this. It is a nuisance, and he is tired of being lied to. He added if the city doesn't want to put the sign back up, they can bring it down and he will put it up. He is not afraid of Jerry. He wants to put the sign back up and if it doesn't go back up, he will put up his sign and he will not take it down. That is a promise. He is tired of asking. He has tried to do everything by the law, but if they don't want to do it, he can. *Mr. Smith began a side conversation with Chief Robinson*. He stated he made no threat to shoot anybody. He is tired of being accused of things he doesn't do. He is tired of the aggravation.

COUNCIL MEMBER COMMENTS: Mayor Williams stated that school starts back up after the holiday and everyone who is driving needs to be aware of all students back in school. Mr. Maxfield stated that is exactly what he was going to say. Mrs. Franklin asked people to remember the holiday weekend and there will be a lot of travelers so stay safe. Ms. Lommatzsch stated she had her MVRPC meeting today, and she shared information with the city engineer. She is hoping they can take advantage of a lot of that money. Ms. Fry stated that September is suicide awareness month. She asks everyone to be an advocate for mental health and more. She stated the national number for suicide hotline is '988'. It is a resource for anyone dealing with a mental health crisis. Anyone who calls that number will be contacted with a team who can respond in a mental health capacity.

**EXECUTIVE SESSION:** Deputy Mayor Denning moved, seconded by Mr. Joseph, to go into executive session for the reason listed on the agenda: 103.01(3) conferences with an attorney representing the City as counsel, concerning disputes involving the City, its council, boards, commissions, officials and employees that are the subject of pending or imminent court action or discussions of any matters which are properly covered under the attorney-client privilege as recognized by the law of Ohio. Roll call went as follows: Mr. Denning, yes; Mr. Joseph, yes; Mrs. Franklin, yes; Ms. Fry; Ms. Lommatzsch, yes; Mr. Maxfield, yes; and Mayor Williams, yes. **Motion carried.** Council went into executive session at 6:36 pm.

**RECONVENE:** Council reconvened at 7:23 pm.

ADJOURNMENT: Mr. Maxfield moved, seconded by Deputy Mayor Denning, to adjourn
All were in favor. <b>Motion carried.</b> The meeting adjourned at 7:23 pm.

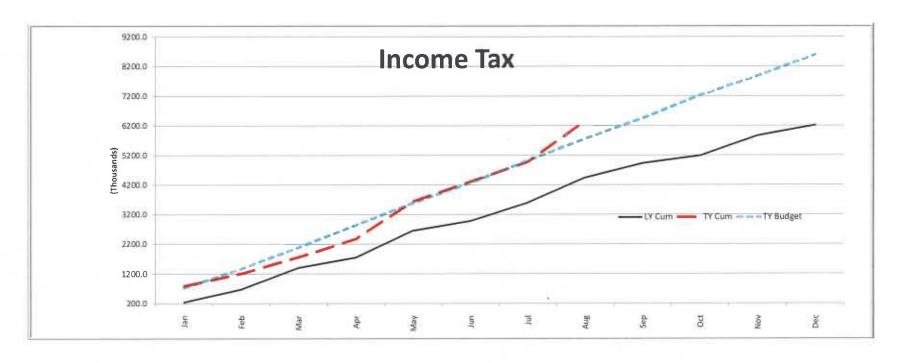

Standards of the Unified Development Ordinance (UDO) of the City of

Riverside, Ohio.

#### **EXPLANATION:**

The City of Riverside has special flood hazard areas (floodplains) that are subject to periodic flooding which may result in loss of life and property, health and safety hazards, and disruption of business and governmental services. The City has adopted floodplain regulations to minimize the threat of flood damage and to promote the public health, safety, and the general welfare.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) issued a Letter of Final Determination to the City of Riverside on April 27, 2022, indicating that revised Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRM) and Flood Insurance Study (FIS) incorporating new flood hazard data will become effective on October 27, 2022. This means that all National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) participating communities affected by the revised mapping in Montgomery County (including Riverside) are required to update their locally adopted floodplain management regulations, so they are effective at least 30 days prior to the effective date.

The proposed text amendment is an updated of the 2017 floodplain language. The Ohio Department of Natural Resource's Model Flood Damage Reduction Regulations updated and approved by FEMA in 2019 were utilized during this amendment process. The new section contains 29 subsections which can be further divided into four larger categories:

- *Foundations* includes purpose section, loss reduction methods, identifies applicable property and the basis for establishing the floodplain.
- Approvals & Review outlines the permitting and review process and the staff members responsible for issuing permits.
- *Design Requirements* lists development and design requirements for large subdivisions, residential structures, and nonresidential structures located in the floodplain.
- Enforcement process for enforcement, variances, and appeals are outlined specifically in the Floodplain Design Standards since they vary from the other UDO sections.

#### RECOMMENDATION

It is respectfully recommended that the Mayor and City Council approve the attached ordinance.

### AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 1113.19 FLOODPLAIN DESIGN STANDARDS OF THE UNIFIED DEVELOPMENT ORDINANCE (UDO) OF THE CITY OF RIVERSIDE, OHIO.

WHEREAS, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) issued a Letter of Final Determination to the City of Riverside indicating that revised Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRM) and Flood Insurance Study (FIS) incorporating new flood hazard data will become effective on October 27, 2022; and

WHEREAS, all National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) participating communities affected by the revised mapping in Montgomery County, including Riverside, Ohio, are required to update their locally adopted floodplain management regulations so they are effective at least 30 days prior to the effective date; and

WHEREAS, the City of Riverside Planning Commission recommends amending the Unified Development Ordinance Section 1113.19 Floodplain Design Standards; and

WHEREAS, The Planning Commission has held at least one public hearing thereon, after notice of the time and place thereof had been given as required by law; and

WHEREAS, ARTICLE XVIII, Section 3, of the Ohio Constitution grants municipalities the legal authority to adopt land use and control measures for promoting the health, safety, and general welfare of its citizens. Therefore, the City Council of the City of Riverside, State of Ohio, does ordain as follows:

**Findings of Fact** - The City of Riverside has special flood hazard areas that are subject to periodic inundation which may result in loss of life and property, health and safety hazards, disruption of commerce and governmental services, extraordinary public expenditures for flood protection and relief, and impairment of the tax base. Additionally, structures that are inadequately elevated, floodproofed, or otherwise protected from flood damage also contribute to the flood loss. In order to minimize the threat of such damages and to achieve the purposes hereinafter set forth, these regulations are adopted.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF RIVERSIDE, STATE OF OHIO:

Section 1:	That Section 1113.19 be amended by including the additional
	definitions and revising the standards for Floodplains as stated in
	"Exhibit A" of this Ordinance.

Section 2: That this Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after the earliest date allowed under law.

#### 1113.19 - Floodplain design standards.

A. *Purpose*. It is the purpose of these regulations to promote the public health, safety and general welfare, and to:

- 1. Protect human life and health;
- 2. Minimize expenditure of public money for costly flood control projects;
- 3. Minimize the need for rescue and relief efforts associated with flooding and generally undertaken at the expense of the general public;
- 4. Minimize prolonged business interruptions;
- Minimize damage to public facilities and utilities such as water and gas mains, electric, telephone and sewer lines, streets and bridges located in areas of special flood hazard;
- 6. Help maintain a stable tax base by providing for the proper use and development of areas of special flood hazard so as to protect property and minimize future flood blight areas;
- 7. Ensure that those who occupy the areas of special flood hazard assume responsibility for their actions;
- 8. Minimize the impact of development on adjacent properties within and near flood prone areas;
- 9. Ensure that the flood storage and conveyance functions of the floodplain are maintained;
- 10. Minimize the impact of development on the natural, beneficial values of the floodplain;
- 11. Prevent floodplain uses that are either hazardous or environmentally incompatible; and
- 12. Meet community participation requirements of the National Flood Insurance Program.
- B. Methods of Reducing Flood Loss. In order to accomplish its purposes, these regulations include methods and provisions for:
  - Restricting or prohibiting uses which are dangerous to health, safety, and property
    due to water hazards, or which result in damaging increases in flood heights or
    velocities;
  - 2. Requiring that uses vulnerable to floods, including facilities which serve such uses, be protected against flood damage at the time of initial construction;
  - 3. Controlling the alteration of natural floodplains, stream channels, and natural protective barriers, which help accommodate or channel flood waters;
  - 4. Controlling filling, grading, dredging, excavating, and other development which may increase flood damage; and
  - 5. Preventing or regulating the construction of flood barriers which will unnaturally

divert flood waters, or which may increase flood hazards in other areas.

- C. Lands to Which Regulations Apply. These regulations shall apply to all areas of special flood hazard within the jurisdiction of the City of Riverside as identified in Section 1113.19.D, including any additional areas of special flood hazard annexed by the City of Riverside.
- D. Basis for Establishing the Areas of Special Flood Hazard. For the purposes of these regulations, the following studies and/or maps are adopted:
  - Montgomery County, Ohio and Incorporated Areas, Flood Insurance Study (FIS),
     effective date Innuary 6, 2005. Flood Insurance Study, Montgomery County, Ohio
     and Incorporated Areas, and Flood Insurance Rate Map, Montgomery County,
     Ohio and Incorporated Areas, both effective October 27, 2022.
  - 2. Montgomery County and Greene Counties, Ohio and Incorporated Areas, Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM), date January 6, 2005Panel numbers: 39113C0266E, 39113C0267E, 39113C0268E, 39113C0269E, 39113C028 39113C0288E, 39113C0352E, 39113C0356E, 39113C0357E, 39113C0358E, 39113C0375E, and 39113C0376E. Other studies and/or maps, which may be relied upon for establishment of the flood protection elevation, delineation of the 100-year floodplain, floodways, or delineation of other areas of special flood hazard, include:
  - Any hydrologic and hydraulic engineering analysis authored by a registered Professional Engineer in the State of Ohio which has been approved by the City of Riverside as required by Section 1113.19.T.3 1113.19.X3, Subdivisions and Large Scale Other New Developments.
  - 4. Any revisions to the aforementioned maps and/or studies are hereby adopted by reference and declared to be a part of these regulations. Such maps and/or studies are on file at the City of Riverside, Public Services Department.
- E. Abrogation and Greater Restrictions. These regulations are not intended to repeal any existing ordinances including subdivisions regulations, zoning or building codes. In the event of a conflict between these regulations and any other ordinance, the more restrictive shall be followed. These regulations shall not impair any deed restriction covenant or easement but the land subject to such interests shall also be governed by the regulations. are not intended to repeal, abrogate, or impair any existing easements, covenants, of deed restrictions. However, where this ordinance and another ordinance, easement, covenant, or deed restriction conflict or overlap, whichever imposes the more stringent restrictions shall prevail.
- F. Interpretation. Where a provision of these regulations may be in conflict with a state or federal law, such state or federal law shall take precedence over these

regulations. In the interpretation and application of these regulations, all provisions shall be:

- 1. Considered as minimum requirements;
- 2. Liberally construed in favor of the governing body; and,
- 3. Deemed neither to limit nor repeal any other powers granted under state statues. Where a provision of these regulations may be in conflict with a state or Federal law, such state or Federal law shall take precedence over these regulations.
- G. Warning and Disclaimer of Liability. The degree of flood protection required by these regulations is considered reasonable for regulatory purposes and is based on scientific and engineering considerations. Larger floods can and will occur on rare occasions. Flood heights may be increased by manmade or natural causes. These regulations do not imply that land outside the areas of special flood hazard or uses permitted within such areas will be free from flooding or flood damage. These regulations shall not create liability on the part of the City of Riverside, any officer or employee thereof, or the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), for any flood damage that results from reliance on these regulations, or any administrative decision lawfully made thereunder.
- H. Designation of the Floodplain Administrator. The Zoning Administrator is hereby appointed to administer and implement these regulations and is referred to herein as the Floodplain Administrator. Severability. Should any Section or provision of these regulations be declared by the courts to be unconstitutional or invalid, such decision shall not affect the validity of the regulations as a whole, or any part thereof, other than the part so declared to be unconstitutional or invalid.
- I. Duties and Responsibilities of the Floodplain Administrator. The duties and responsibilities of the Floodplain Administrator shall include but are not limited to: Definitions. Unless specifically defined below, words or phrases used in these regulations shall be interpreted so as to give them the meaning they have in common usage and to give these regulations the most reasonable application.
  - Evaluate applications for permits to develop in special flood hazard areas. Accessory
     Structure- a structure on the same lot with, and of a nature customarily incidental and subordinate to the principal structure.
  - 2. Interpret floodplain boundaries and provide flood hazard and flood protectionelevation information. Appeal- a request for review of the floodplain administrator's interpretation of any provision of these regulations or a request for a variance.
  - 3. Issue permits to develop in special flood hazard areas when the provisions of these-

regulations have been met or refuse to issue the same in the event of noncompliance. Base Flood-the flood having a one percent chance being equaled or exceeded in any given year. The base flood may also be referred to as the 1% chance annual flood or 100-year flood.

- 4. Inspect buildings and lands to determine whether any violations of these regulations have been committed. Base (100-Year) Flood Elevation (BFE)- the water surface elevation of the base flood in relation to a specified datum, usually the National Geodetic Vertical Datum of 1929 or the North American Vertical Datum of 1988, and usually expressed in feet mean sea level (MSL). In Zone AO areas, the base flood elevation is the lowest adjacent natural grade elevation plus the depth number (from 1 to 3 feet).
- 5. Make and permanently keep all records for public inspection necessary for the administration of these regulations including Flood Insurance Rate Maps, Letters of Map Amendment and Revision, records of issuance and denial of permits to develop inspecial flood hazard areas, determinations of whether development is in or out of special flood hazard areas for the purpose of issuing floodplain development permits, elevation certificates, variances, and records of enforcement actions taken for violations of these regulations. Basement- any are of the building having is floor subgrade (below ground level) on all sides.
- 6. Enforce the provisions of these regulations. Development- any manmade change to improved or unimproved real estate, including but not limited to buildings or other structures, mining, dredging, filling, grading, paving, excavation, or drilling operations or storage of equipment or materials.
- 7. Provide information, testimony, or other evidence as needed during variance hearings.

  Enclosure Below the Lowest Floor- see "Lowest Floor."
- 8. Coordinate map maintenance activities and FEMA follow up. Executive Order 11988 (Floodplain Management-Issued by President Carter in 1977, this order requires that no federally assisted activities be conducted in or have the potential to affect identified special flood hazard areas, unless there is no practicable alternative.
- 9. Conduct substantial damage determinations to determine whether existing structures, damaged from any source and in special flood hazard areas identified by FEMA, must meet the development standards of these regulations. Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA)- the agency with the overall responsibility for administering the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP).
- 10. Fill- a deposit of earth material placed by artificial means.
- 11. Flood or Flooding- a general and temporary condition of partial or complete inundation

of normally dry land areas from:

- a. The overflow of inland or tidal waters, and/or
- b. The unusual and rapid accumulation or runoff of surface waters from any source.
- 12. Flood Hazard Boundary Map (FHBM)- usually the initial map, produced by the Federal Emergency Management Agency, or U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, for a community depicting approximate special flood hazard areas.
- 13. Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM)- an official map on which the Federal Emergency Management Agency or the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development has delineated the areas of special flood hazard.
- 14. Flood Insurance Risk Zones- Zone designated on FHBMs and FIRMs that indicate the magnitude of the flood hazard area in specific areas of a community. Following are the zone definitions:
  - Zone A- Special flood hazard areas inundated by the 100-year flood in any given year; base flood elevations are not determined.
  - Zones A1-30 and Zone AE-Special flood hazard areas inundated by the 100-year flood in any given year; base flood elevations are determined.
  - Zone AO- Special flood hazard areas inundated by the 100-year flood in any given year; with flood depths of 1 to 3 feet (usually sheet flow on sloping terrain); average depths are determined.
  - Zone AH- Special flood hazard areas inundated by the 100-year flood in any given year; flood depths of usually 1 to 3 feet (usually areas of ponding); base flood elevations are determined.
  - Zone A99- Special flood hazard areas inundated by the 100-year flood to be protected from the 100-year flood by a <u>federal</u> flood protection system under construction; no base flood elevations are determined.
  - Zone B and Zone X(shaded)- Areas of 500-year flood; subject to the 100-year flood with average depths of less than 1 foot or with contributing drainage area less than 1 square mile; and areas protected by levees from the base flood elevation.
  - Zone C and Zone X (unshaded)- Areas determined to be outside of the 500-year floodplain.
- 15. Flood Insurance Study (FIS)- the official report in which the Federal Emergency
  Management Agency or the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development has
  provided flood profiles, floodway boundaries (sometimes shown on the Flood
  Boundary and Floodway Maps), and the water surface elevations of the base flood.

16. Floodproofing- any combination of structural and non-structural additions, changes, or adjustments to structures which reduce or eliminate flood damage to real estate or improved real property, water and sanitary facilities, structures, and their contents.

- 17. Flood Protection Elevation the Flood Protection Elevation or FPE is the base flood elevation of freeboard. In areas where no base flood elevations exist from any authoritative source, the flood protection elevation can be historical flood elevations, or base flood elevations determined and/or approved by the floodplain administrator.
- 18. Floodway- a floodway is the channel of a river or other watercourse and the adjacent land areas that have been reserved in order to pass the base flood discharge. A floodway is typically determined through a hydraulic and hydrologic engineering analysis such that the cumulative increase in the water surface elevation of the base flood discharge is no more than a designated height. In no case shall the designated height be more than one foot at any point within the community.
  - The floodway is an extremely hazardous area and is usually characterized by any of the following: Moderate to high velocity flood waters, high potential for debris and projectile impacts, and moderate to high erosion forces.
- 19. Freeboard- a factor of safety usually expressed in feet above a flood level for the purposes of floodplain management. Freeboard tends to compensate for the many unknown factors that could contribute to flood heights greater than the height calculated for a selected size flood and floodway conditions, such as a wave action, obstructed bridge openings, debris, and ice jams, and the hydrologic effect of urbanization in a watershed.
- 20. Historic structure Any structure that is:
  - a. Listed individually in the National Register of Historic Places (a listing maintained by the U.S. Department of Interior) or preliminarily determined by the Secretary of the Interior as meeting the requirements for individual listings on the National Register;
  - b. Certified or preliminarily determined by the Secretary of the Interior as contributing to the historical significance of a registered historic district or a district preliminarily determined by the Secretary to qualify as a registered historic district; or
  - c. Individually listed on the State of Ohio's inventory of historic places maintained by the Ohio Historic Preservation Office.
  - d. Individually listed on the inventory of historic places maintained by the City of Riverside's historic preservation program, which program is certified by the Ohio Historic Preservation Office.
- 21. Hydrologic and hydraulic engineering analysis- an analysis performed by a professional engineer, registered in the State of Ohio, in accordance with standard engineering

practices as accepted by FEMA, used to determine flood elevations and/or floodway boundaries.

22. Letter of Map Change (LOMC)- A letter of Map Change is the official FEMA determination, by letter, to amend or revise effective Flood Insurance Rate Maps, Flood Boundary and Floodway Maps, and Flood Insurance Studies. LOMCs are broken down into the following categories:

Letter of Map Amendment (LOMA)- a revision based on technical data showing that a property was incorrectly included in a designated special flood hazard area. A LOMA amends the current effective Flood Insurance Rate Map and establishes that a specific property is not located in a special flood hazard area. Letter of Map Revision (LOMR)- a revision based on technical data that, usually due to manmade changes, shows changes to flood zones, flood elevations, floodplain and floodway delineations, and planimetric features. One common type of LOMR, a LOMR-F, is a determination concerning whether a structure or parcel has been elevated by fill above the base flood elevation and is, therefore, excluded from the special flood hazard area.

Conditional Letter of Map Revision (CLOMR)- a comment by FEMA regarding a proposed project that would, upon construction, affect the hydrologic or hydraulic characteristics of a flooding source and thus result in the modification of the existing regulatory floodway, the effective base flood elevations, of the special flood hazard area. A CLOMR does <u>not</u> amend or revise effective Flood Insurance Rate Maps, Flood Boundary and Floodway Maps, or Flood Insurance Studies.

- 23. Lowest Floor- the lowest floor of the enclosed area (including basement) of a structure. This definition excludes an "enclosure below the lowest floor" which is an unfinished or flood resistant enclosure usable solely for parking of vehicles, building access or storage, in an area other than a basement area, provided that such enclosure is built in accordance with the applicable design requirements specified in these regulations for enclosures below the lowest floor.
- 24. Manufactured home- A structure, transportable in one or sections, which is built on a permanent chassis and is designed for use with or without a permanent foundation when connected to the required utilities. The term "manufactured home" does not include a "recreational vehicle." For the purposes of these regulations, a manufactured home includes manufactured homes and homes as defined in Chapter 4781 of the Ohio Revised Code.
- 25. Manufactured home park- As specified in the Ohio Admin. Code 4781-12-01(K), a

manufactured home park means any tract of land upon which three or more manufactured homes, used for habitation are parked, either free of charge or for revenue purposes, and includes any roadway, building, structure, vehicle, or enclosure used or intended for use a part of the facilities of the park. A tract of land that is subdivided and the individual lots are nor for rent or rented, but for sale or sold for purpose of installation of manufactured homes on the lost is not a manufactured home park, even though three or more manufactured home are parked thereon, if the roadways are dedicated to the local government authority. Manufactured home park does not include any tract of land used solely for the storage or display of manufactured homes.

- 26. Mean Sea Level- for the purposes of the National Flood Insurance Program, the National Geodetic Vertical Datum (NGVD) of 1929 or other datum, to which base flood elevations are shown on a community's Flood Insurance Rate Map are referenced.
- 27. National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP)- is a Federal Program enabling property owners in participating communities to purchase insurance protection against flood losses from flooding. This insurance is designed to provide an insurance alternative to disaster assistance to meet the escalating costs of repairing damage to buildings and their contents caused by floods. Participation in the NFIP is based on an agreement between local communities and the Federal government that states if a community will adopt and enforce floodplain management regulations to reduce future flood risks to all development in special flood hazard areas, the Federal government will make flood insurance available within the community as a financial protection against flood loss.
- 28. New Construction- structures for which the "start of construction" commenced on or after the effective date of a floodplain regulation adopted by the City of Riverside and includes any subsequent improvements to such structures.
  For the purposes of determining insurance rates, structures for which the "start of construction" commenced on or after the effective date of an initial FIRM [December 15, 1981] or after December 31, 1974, whichever is later and includes any subsequent improvements to such structures.
- 29. Person-includes any individual or group of individuals, corporation, partnership, association, or any other entity, including state and local governments and agencies. Any agency is further defined in the Ohio Rev. Code §111.15(A)(2) as any governmental entity of the state and includes, but is not limited to any board, department, division, commission, bureau, society, council, institution, state college or university, community college district, technical college district, or state community college. "Agency" does not include the general assembly, the controlling board, the adjutant general's department, or any court.

30. Recreational Vehicle- a vehicle which is (1) built on a single chassis, (2) 400 square feet or less when measured at the largest horizontal projection, (3) designed to be self-propelled or permanently towable by a light duty truck, and (4) designed primarily not for use as a permanent dwelling but as temporary living quarters for recreational, camping, travel, or seasonal use.

- 31. Registered Professional Architect- A person registered to engage in the practice of architecture pursuant to Ohio Rev. Code §4703.01 and 4703.19.
- 32. Registered Professional Engineer- Aperson registered as a professional engineer pursuant to Ohio Rev. Code Chapter 4733.
- 33. Registered Professional Surveyor- Aperson registered as a professional surveyor pursuant to Ohio Rev. Code Chapter 4733.
- 34. Special Flood Hazard Area- Also known as "Areas of Special Flood Hazard", it is the land in the floodplain subject to a one percent or greater chance of flooding in any given year. Special flood hazard areas are designated by the Federal Emergency Management Agency on Flood Insurance Rate Maps, Flood Insurance Studies, Flood Boundary and Floodway Maps and Flood Hazard Boundary Maps as Zones A, AE, AH, AO, A1-30, or A99. Special flood hazard areas may also refer to areas that are flood prone and designated from other federal state or local sources of data including but not limited to historical flood information reflecting high water marks, previous flood inundation areas, and flood prone soils associated with a watercourse.
- 35. Start of Construction- The date the building permit was issued, provided the actual start of construction, repair, reconstruction, rehabilitation, addition, placement, or other improvement was within 180 days of the permit date. The actual start means either the first placement of permanent construction of a structure on a site, such as the pouring of slab or footings, the installation of piles, the construction of columns, or any work beyond the stage of excavation; or the placement of a manufactured home on a foundation. Permanent construction does not include land preparation, such as clearing, grading, and filling; nor does it include the installation of streets and/or walkways; nor does it include excavation for a basement, footings, piers, or foundations or the erection of temporary forms; nor does it include the installation on the property of accessory buildings, such as garages or sheds not occupied as dwelling units or not part of the main structure. For a substantial improvement, the actual start of construction means the first alteration of any wall, ceiling, floor, or other structural part of a building, whether or not that alteration affects the external dimensions of a building.
- 36. Structure- A walled and roofed building, manufactured home, or gas or liquid storage tank that is principally above ground.

37. Substantial Damage-Damage of any origin sustained by a structure whereby the cost of restoring the structure to the 'before damaged' condition would equal or exceed 50 percent of the market value of the structure before the damage occurred

- 38. Substantial Improvement- Any reconstruction, rehabilitation, addition, or other improvement of a structure, the cost of which equals or exceeds 50 percent of the market value of the structure before the "start of construction" of the improvement.

  This term includes structures, which have incurred "substantial damage," regardless of the actual repair work performed. The term does not, however, include:
  - a. Any project for improvement of a structure to correct existing violations of state or local health, sanitary, or safety code specifications which have been identified by the local code enforcement official and which are the minimum necessary to assure safe living conditions; or
  - b. Any alteration of a "historic structure," provided that the alteration would not preclude the structure's continued designation as a "historic structure".
- 39. Variance- a grant of relief from the standards of these regulations.
- 40. Violation- the failure of a structure or other development to be fully compliant with these regulations.
- J. Floodplain Development Permits. It shall be unlawful for any person to begin construction or other development activity including but not limited to filling; grading; construction; alteration, remodeling, or expanding any structure; or alteration or any watercourse wholly within, partially within or in contact with any identified special flood hazard area, as established in Section 1113.19.D until a floodplain development permit is obtained from the Floodplain Administrator. Such floodplain development permit shall show that the proposed development activity is in conformity with the provisions of these regulations. No such permit shall be issued by the Floodplain Administrator until the requirements of these regulations have been met Designation of the Floodplain Administrator. The Zoning Administrator and their designee, such as technical consultants or agencies authorized by the City Manager, is hereby appointed to administer, and implement these regulations and is referred to herein as the Floodplain Administrator. All documented costs incurred in the administration and enforcement of this ordinance shall be passed on the property owner.
- K. Application Required. An application for a floodplain development permit shall be required for all development activities located wholly within, partially within, or incontact with an identified special flood hazard area. Such application shall be made by the owner of the property or his or her authorized agent, herein referred to as the

applicant, prior to the actual commencement of such construction on a formfurnished for that purpose. Where it is unclear whether a development site is in a
special flood hazard area, the Floodplain Administrator may require an application for
a floodplain development permit to determine the development's location. Such
applications shall include, but not be limited to: Duties and Responsibilities of the
Floodplain Administrator. The duties and responsibilities of the Floodplain
Administrator shall include but are not limited to:

- Site plans drawn to scale showing the nature, location, dimensions, and topography of
  the area in question; the location of existing or proposed structures, fill, storage of
  materials, drainage facilities, and the location of the foregoing. Evaluate applications for
  permits to develop in special flood hazard areas.
- 2. Elevation of the existing, natural ground where structures are proposed. Interpret floodplain boundaries and provide flood hazard and flood protection elevation information.
- 3. Elevation of the lowest floor, including basement, of all proposed structures.
  Issue permits to develop in special flood hazard areas when the provisions of these regulations have been met or refuse to issue the same in the event of noncompliance.
- 4. Such other material and information as may be requested by the Floodplain Administrator to determine conformance with and provide enforcement of these regulations. Inspect buildings and lands to determine whether any violations of these regulations have been committed.
- 5. Technical analyses conducted by the appropriate design professional registered in the State of Ohio and submitted with an application for a floodplain development permit when applicable: Make and permanently keep all records for public inspection necessary for the administration of these regulations including Flood Insurance Rate Maps, Letters of Map Amendment and Revision, records of issuance and denial of permits to develop in special flood hazard areas, determinations of whether development is in or out of special flood hazard areas for the purpose of issuing floodplain development permits, elevation certificates, variances, and records of enforcement actions taken for violations of these regulations.
- a) Flood proofing certification for nonresidential flood proofed structure as required in Section 1113.19.T.5.

b) Certification that fully enclosed areas below the lowest floor of a structure not meeting the design requirements of Section 1113.19.T.5 are designed to automatically equalize hydrostatic flood forces.

c) Description of any watercourse alteration or relocation that the flood carrying capacity of the
watercourse will not be diminished, and maintenance assurances as required in Section 1113.19.T.9.
d) Ahydrologic and hydraulic analysis demonstrating that the cumulative effect of proposed
development, when combined with all other existing and anticipated development will not increase the
water surface elevation of the base flood by more than one foot in special flood hazard areas where the
Federal Emergency Management Agency has provided base flood elevations, but no floodway as required
<del>by Section <i>1113.19.</i>T.9.b.</del>
e) A hydrologic and hydraulic engineering analysis showing impact of any development on flood-
heights in an identified floodway as required by Section 1113.19.T.9.a.
f) Generation of base flood elevation(s) for subdivision and large scale developments as required
by Section -1113.19.T.3.

- 6. Enforce the provisions of these regulations.
- 7. Provide information, testimony, or other evidence as needed during variance hearings.
- 8. Coordinate map maintenance activities and FEMA follow up.
- Conduct substantial damage determinations to determine whether existing structures, damaged from any source and in special flood hazard areas identified by FEMA, must meet the development standards of these regulations.
- L. Review and Approval of a Floodplain Development Permits Application.

#### 1. Review.

a. After receipt of a complete application, the Floodplain Administrator shall review the application to ensure that the standards of these regulations have been met. No floodplain development permit application shall be reviewed until all information required in Section 1113.19.K has been received by the Floodplain Administrator.

b. The Floodplain Administrator shall review all floodplain development permit applications to assure that all necessary permits have been received from those federal, state or local governmental agencies from which prior approval is required. The applicant shall be responsible for obtaining such permits as required including permits issued by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers under Section 10 of the Rivers and Harbors Act and Section 404 of the Clean Water Act, and the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency under Section 401 of the Clean Water Act.

2. Approval. Within 30 days after the receipt of a complete application, the Floodplain Administrator shall either approve or disapprove the application. If an application is approved, a floodplain development permit shall be issued. All floodplain development permits shall be conditional upon the commencement of work within one year. A floodplain development permit shall expire one year after issuance unless the permitted activity has commenced and is thereafter pursued to completion.

Floodplain Development Permits. It shall be unlawful for any person to begin construction or other development activity including but not limited to filling; grading; construction; alteration, remodeling, or expanding any structure; or alteration or any

watercourse wholly within, partially within or in contact with any identified special flood hazard area, as established in Section 1113.19.F until a floodplain development permit is obtained from the Floodplain Administrator. Such floodplain development permit shall show that the proposed development activity is in conformity with the provisions of these regulations. No such permit shall be issued by the Floodplain Administrator until the requirements of these regulations have been met.

- M. Inspections. The Floodplain Administrator shall make periodic inspections at appropriate times throughout the period of construction in order to monitor compliance with permit conditions. Application Required. An application for a floodplain development permit shall be required for all development activities located wholly within, partially within, or in contact with an identified special flood hazard area. Such application shall be made by the owner of the property or his or her authorized agent, herein referred to as the applicant, prior to the actual commencement of such construction on a form furnished for that purpose. Where it is unclear whether a development site is in a special flood hazard area, the Floodplain Administrator may require an application for a floodplain development permit to determine the development's location. Such applications shall include, but not be limited to:
  - 1. Site plans drawn to scale showing the nature, location, dimensions, and topography of the area in question; the location of existing or proposed structures, fill, storage of materials, drainage facilities, and the location of the foregoing.
  - 2. Elevation of the existing, natural ground where structures are proposed.
  - 3. Elevation of the lowest floor, including basement, of all proposed structures.
  - Such other material and information as may be requested by the Floodplain
     Administrator to determine conformance with and provide enforcement of these regulations.
  - 5. Technical analyses conducted by the appropriate design professional registered in the State of Ohio and submitted with an application for a floodplain development permit when applicable:
    - a. Flood proofing certification for nonresidential flood proofed structure as required in Section 1113.19.X5.
    - b. Certification that fully enclosed areas below the lowest floor of a structure not meeting the design requirements of Section 1113.19.X4.e are designed to automatically equalize hydrostatic flood forces.
    - c. Description of any watercourse alteration or relocation that the flood carrying capacity of the watercourse will not be diminished, and maintenance

assurances as required in Section 1113.19.X9.c.

- d. A hydrologic and hydraulic analysis demonstrating that the cumulative effect of proposed development, when combined with all other existing and anticipated development will not increase the water surface elevation of the base flood by more than one foot in special flood hazard areas where the Federal Emergency Management Agency has provided base flood elevations, but no floodway as required by Section 1113.19.X9.b.
- e. Ahydrologic and hydraulic engineering analysis showing impact of any development on flood heights in an identified floodway as required by Section 1113.19.X9.a.
- f. Generation of base flood elevation(s) for subdivision and Other New developments as required by Section 1113.19.X3.
- N. Post Construction Certifications Required. The following as built certifications are required after a floodplain development permit has been issued.
  - 1. For new or substantially improved residential structures, or nonresidential structures that have been elevated, the applicant shall have a Federal Emergency Management Agency Elevation Certificate completed by a registered surveyor to record as built elevation data. For elevated structures in Zone A and Zone AO areas without a base flood elevation, the elevation certificate may be completed by the property owner or owner's representative.
  - 2. For all development activities subject to the standards of Section 1113.19.Q, a letter of map revision.

Review and Approval of a Floodplain Development Permits Application.

#### 1. Review.

- a. After receipt of a complete application, the Floodplain Administrator shall review the application to ensure that the standards of these regulations have been met. No floodplain development permit application shall be reviewed until all information required in Section 1113.19.M has been received by the Floodplain Administrator.
- b. The Floodplain Administrator shall review all floodplain development permit applications to assure that all necessary permits have been received from those federal, state, or local governmental agencies from which prior approval is required. The applicant shall be responsible for obtaining such permits as required including permits issued by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers under Section 10 of the Rivers and Harbors Act and Section 404 of the Clean Water Act, and the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency under Section 401 of the

Clean Water Act.

2. Approval. Within 30 days after the receipt of a complete application, the Floodplain Administrator shall either approve or disapprove the application. If an application is approved, a floodplain development permit shall be issued. All floodplain development permits shall be conditional upon the commencement of work within one year. A floodplain development permit shall expire one year after issuance unless the permitted activity has commenced and is thereafter pursued to completion.

- O. Revoking a Floodplain Development Permit. A floodplain development permit shall be revocable, if among other things, the actual development activity does not conform to the terms of the application and permit granted thereon. In the event of the revocation of a permit, an appeal may be taken as provided in Section 1105.19, Appeal Procedure of this UDO. Inspections. The Floodplain Administrator shall make periodic inspections at appropriate times throughout the period of construction in order to monitor compliance with permit conditions.
- P. Exemption from Filing a Development Permit. Post Construction Certifications Required. The following as built certifications are required after a floodplain development permit has been issued:
  - 1. An application for a floodplain development permit shall not be required for: For new or substantially improved residential structures, or nonresidential structures that have been elevated, the applicant shall have a Federal Emergency Management Agency Elevation Certificate completed by a registered professional surveyor to record as built elevation data. For elevated structures in Zone A and Zone AO areas without a base flood elevation, the elevation certificate may be completed by the property owner or owner's representative.
    - a. Maintenance work such as roofing, painting, and basement sealing, or forsmall nonstructural development activities (except for filling and grading) valuedat less than five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00).
    - b. Development activities in an existing or proposed manufactured home park that are under the authority of the Ohio Department of Health and subject to the flood damage reduction provisions of the Ohio Administrative Code Section 3701.
    - e. Major utility facilities permitted by the Ohio Power Siting Board under Ohio-R.C. Ch. 4906.
    - d. Hazardous waste disposal facilities permitted by the Hazardous Waste Siting-Board under Ohio R.C. Ch. 3734.
    - e. Development activities undertaken by a federal agency, and which are

- subject to Federal Executive Order 11988 B Floodplain Management.
- 2. Any proposed action exempt from filing for a floodplain development permit is also exempt from the standards of these regulations. For all development activities subject to the standards of Section 1113.19.Q 1113.19.T.1, a letter of map revision.
- 3. For new or substantially improved nonresidential structures that have been floodproofed in lieu of elevation, where allowed, the applicant shall supply a completed Floodproofing Certificate for Non-Residential Structures completed by a registered professional engineer or architect together with associated documentation.
- Q. Map Maintenance Activities. To meet National Flood Insurance Program minimum requirements to have flood data reviewed and approved by FEMA, and to ensure that City of Riverside flood maps, studies and other data identified in Section 1113.19.D accurately represent flooding conditions so appropriate floodplain management criteria are based on current data, the following map maintenance activities are identified:
  - 1. Requirement to Submit New Technical Data.
  - a. For all development proposals that impact floodway delineations or base floodelevations, the community shall ensure that technical data reflecting such changes besubmitted to FEMA within six months of the data such information becomes available. These development proposals include:
  - 1) Floodway encroachments that increase or decrease base flood elevations or alter floodway boundaries:
  - 2) Fill sites to be used for the placement of proposed structures where the applicant desires to remove the site from the special flood hazard area;
  - 3) Alteration of watercourses that result in a relocation or elimination of the special floodhazard area, including the placement of culverts; and
  - 4) Subdivision or large scale development proposals requiring the establishment of base flood elevations in accordance with Section 1113.19.T.
  - b. It is the responsibility of the applicant to have technical data, required in accordance with subsection Q.1.a of this section, prepared in a format required for a Conditional Letter of Map Revision or Letter of Map Revision, and submitted to FEMA. Submittal and processing fees for these map revisions shall be the responsibility of the applicant.
  - c. The Floodplain Administrator shall require a Conditional Letter of Map Revision prior tothe issuance of a floodplain development permit for:
  - 1) Proposed floodway encroachments that increase the base flood elevation; and
  - 2)Proposed development which increases the base flood elevation by more than one foot in areas where FEMA has provided base flood elevations but no floodway.

d. Floodplain development permits issued by the Floodplain Administrator shall be conditioned upon the applicant obtaining a Letter of Map Revision from FEMA for any development proposal subject to subsection Q.1.a of this section.

- 2. Right to Submit New Technical Data. The Floodplain Administrator may request changes to any of the information shown on an effective map that does not impact floodplain or floodway delineations or base flood elevations, such as labeling or planimetric details. Such a submission shall include appropriate supporting documentation made in writing by the City Manager of the City of Riverside and may be submitted at any time.
- 3. Annexation/Detachment. Upon occurrence, the Floodplain Administrator shall notify FEMA in writing whenever the boundaries of the City of Riverside have been modified by annexation or the community has assumed authority over an area, or no longer has authority to adopt and enforce floodplain management regulations for a particular area. In order that the City of Riverside's Flood Insurance Rate Map accurately represents the City of Riverside boundaries, include within such notification a copy of a map of the City of Riverside suitable for reproduction, clearly showing the new corporate limits or the new area for which the City of Riverside has assumed or relinquished floodplain management regulatory authority.
- Q. Revoking a Floodplain Development Permit. A floodplain development permit shall be revocable, if among other things, the actual development activity does not conform to the terms of the application and permit granted thereon. In the event of the revocation of a permit, an appeal may be taken to the Board of Zoning Appeals as provided in Section 1105.17, Appeal Procedure of this UDO.
- R. Data Use and Flood Map Interpretation. The following guidelines shall apply to the use and interpretation of maps and other data showing areas of special flood hazard: Exemption from Filing a Development Permit.
  - 1. In areas where FEMA has not identified special flood hazard areas, or in FEMA identified special flood hazard areas where bae flood elevation and floodway data have not been identified, the Floodplain Administrator shall review and reasonably utilize any other flood hazard data available from a federal, state, or other source. An application for a floodplain development permit shall not be required for-maintenance work such as roofing, painting, and basement sealing, or for small nonstructural development activities (except for filling and grading) valued at less than \$2500.
  - 2. Base flood elevations and floodway boundaries produced on FEMA flood maps and studies shall take precedence over base flood elevations and floodway boundaries by any other source that reflect a reduced floodway width and/or lower base flood elevations. Other sources of data, showing increased, base flood elevations and/or larger floodway areas than are shown on FEMA flood maps and studies, shall be

- reasonably used by the Floodplain Administrator.
- 3. When Preliminary Flood Insurance Rate Maps and/or Flood Insurance Study have been provided by FEMA:
  - a. Upon the issuance of a Letter of Final Determination by the FEMA, the preliminary flood hazard data shall be used and replace all previously existing flood hazard data provided from FEMA for the purposes of administering these regulations.
  - b. Prior to the issuance of a Letter of Final Determination by FEMA, the use of preliminary flood hazard data shall only be required where no base flood elevations and/or floodway areas exist or where the preliminary base flood elevations or floodway area exceed the base flood elevations and/or floodway widths in existing flood hazard data provided from FEMA. Such preliminary data may be subject to change and/or appeal to FEMA.
- S. Substantial Damage Determination State and Federal Development.
  - 1. Damages to structures may result from a variety of causes including, flood, tornado, wind, heavy snow, fire, etc. After such a damage event, the Floodplain Administrator shall: Development that is funded, financed, undertaken, or preempted by state agencies shall comply with minimum NFIP criteria.
    - a. Determine whether damaged structures are located in special flood hazard areas;
      b. Conduct substantial damage determination for damaged structures located in special flood hazard areas; and
    - c. Make reasonable attempt to notify owners of substantially damaged structures of the need to obtain a floodplain development permit prior to repair, rehabilitation, or reconstruction.
  - 2. Additionally, the Floodplain Administrator may implement other measures to assist with the substantial damage determination and subsequent repair process. These measures include issuing press releases, public service announcements, and other public information materials related to the flood plain development permits and repair of damaged structures; coordinating with other federal, state, and local agencies to assist with substantial damage determinations; providing owners of damaged structures materials and other information related to the proper repair of damaged structures with increased cost of compliance insurance claims. Before awarding funding or financing or granting a license, permit, or other authorization for a development that is or is to be located within a 100-year floodplain, a state agency shall require the applicant to demonstrate to the satisfaction of the agency that the development will comply with the minimum NFIP criteria, and any applicable local floodplain management resolution or ordinance as required by Ohio Revised Code Section 1521.13. This includes but is not

#### limited to:

a. Development activities in an existing or proposed manufactured home park that are under the authority of the Ohio Department of Commerce and subject to the flood damage reduction provisions of the Ohio Administrative Code Section 4781-12.

- b. Major utility facilities permitted by the Ohio Power Siting Board under Section 4906 of the Ohio Revised Code.
- c. Hazardous waste disposal facilities permitted by the Hazardous Waste Siting Board under Section 3734 of the Ohio Revised Code.
- 3. Development activities undertaken by a federal agency, and which are subject to Federal Executive Order 11988 Floodplain Management.
  - a. Each federal agency has a responsibility to evaluate the potential effects of any actions it may take in a floodplain; to ensure that its planning programs and budget request reflect consideration of flood hazards and floodplain management; and to prescribe procedures to implement the policies and requirements of EO 11988.
- T. Use and Development Standards for Flood Hazard Reduction. The following use and development standards apply to development wholly within, partially within, or in contact with any flood hazard area as established in Section 1113.19. Map Maintenance Activities. To meet National Flood Insurance Program minimum requirements to have flood data reviewed and approved by FEMA, and to ensure that City of Riverside flood maps, studies and other data identified in Section 1113.19.D accurately represent flooding conditions so appropriate floodplain management criteria are based on current data, the following map maintenance activities are identified:

#### 3. Subdivisions and Large Developments.

a. All subdivision proposals shall be consistent with the need to minimize flood damage and are subject to all applicable standards in these regulations;

b. All subdivision proposals shall have public utilities and facilities such as sewer, gas, electrical, and water systems located and constructed to minimize flood damage;

c. All subdivision proposals shall have adequate drainage provided to reduce exposure toflood damage; and

d. In all areas of special flood hazard where base flood elevation data are not available, the applicant shall provide a hydrologic and hydraulic engineering analysis that generates base flood elevations for all subdivision proposals and other proposed developments containing at least 50 lots or five acres, whichever is less.

e. The applicant shall meet the requirement to submit technical data to FEMA in Section 1111.09.U.1.a.4), when a hydrologic and hydraulic analysis is completed that generates base flood elevations as required by subsection d above.

#### 4. Residential Structures.

a. New construction and substantial improvements shall be anchored to prevent flotation, collapse, or lateral movement of the structure resulting from hydrodynamic and hydrostatic loads, including the effects of buoyancy. Where a structure, including its foundation members, is elevated on fill to or above the base flood elevation, the requirements for anchoring (this subsection T.4.a and construction materials resistant to flood damage (subsection T.4.b below) are satisfied.

b. New construction and substantial improvements shall be constructed with methods and materials resistant to flood damage.

c. New construction and substantial improvements shall be constructed with electrical, heating, ventilation, plumbing and air conditioning equipment and other services facilities that are designed and/or elevated so as to prevent water from entering or accumulating within the components during conditions of flooding.

d. New construction and substantial improvement of any residential structure, including manufactured homes, shall have the lowest floor, including basement, elevated at least two-feet above the highest adjacent natural grade.

e. New construction and substantial improvements, including manufactured homes that donot have basements and that are elevated to the flood protection.

1) Be used only for the parking of vehicles, building access, or storage; and
2) Be designed and certified by a registered professional engineer or architect to
automatically equalize hydrostatic flood forces on exterior walls by allowing for
the entry and exit of flood waters; or
3) Have a minimum of two openings on different walls having a total net area not
less than one square inch for every square foot of enclosed area, and the bottom
of all such openings being no higher than one foot above grade. The openings
may be equipped with screens, louvers, or other coverings or devices provided
that they permit the automatic entry and exit of flood waters.
f. Manufactured homes shall be affixed to a permanent foundation and anchored to
prevent flotation, collapse or lateral movement of the structure resulting from
hydrodynamic and hydrostatic loads, including the effects of buoyancy. Methods of
anchoring may include, but are not limited to, use of over the top or frame ties to ground-
anchors.
g. Repair or rehabilitation of historic structures upon a determination that the proposed
repair or rehabilitation will not preclude the structure's continued designation as a historic
structure and is the minimum necessary to preserve the historic character and design of
the structure, shall be exempt from the development standards of this subsection T.4.g.
h. In AO Zones, new construction and substantial improvement shall have adequate
drainage paths around structures on slopes to guide flood waters around and away from
the structure.
5. Nonresidential Structures.
a. New construction and substantial improvement of any commercial, industrial or other
nonresidential structure shall meet the requirements of subsection T.4.a c.
b. New construction and substantial improvement of any commercial, industrial or other
nonresidential structure shall either have the lowest floor, including basement, elevated to
or above the level of the flood protection elevation; or, together with attendant utility and
sanitary facilities, shall meet all of the following standards:
1) Be dry flood proofed so that the structure is watertight with walls substantially
impermeable to the passage of water to the level of the flood protection
elevation;
-2) Have structural components capable of resisting hydrostatic and hydrodynamic
loads and effects of buoyancy; and
-3) Be certified by a registered professional engineer or architect, through the use of
a Federal Emergency Management Floodproofing Certificate, that the design and
methods of construction are in accordance with subsections T.5.b.1) and 2)

above.
c. In Zone AO areas with no elevations specified, the structure shall have the lowest floor,
including basement, elevated at least two feet above the highest adjacent natural grade.
6. Accessory Structures. Relief to the elevation or dry floodproofing standards may be
granted for accessory structures containing no more than 600 square feet. Such structures
must meet the following standards:
a. They shall not be used for human habitation;
b. They shall be constructed of flood resistant materials;
c. They shall be constructed and placed on the lot to offer the minimum resistance to the
flow of flood waters;
d. They shall be firmly anchored to prevent flotation;
e. Service facilities such as electrical and heating equipment shall be elevated or
floodproofed to or above the level of the flood protection elevation; and
f. They shall meet the opening requirements of subsection T.4.e.3) above.
7. Recreational Vehicles. Recreational vehicles must meet at least one of the following
standards:
a. They shall not be located on sites in special flood hazard areas for more than 180 days, or
b. They must be fully licensed and ready for highway use, or
c. They must meet all standards of subsection T.4 above.
8. Above Ground Gas or Liquid Storage Tanks. All above ground gas or liquid storage tanks
shall be anchored to prevent flotation or lateral movement resulting from hydrodynamic
and hydrostatic loads.
9. Assurance of Flood Carrying Capacity. Pursuant to the purpose and methods of reducing
flood damage stated in these regulations, the following additional standards are adopted to
assure that the reduction of the flood carrying capacity of watercourses is minimized:
a. Development in Floodways.
— 1) In floodway areas, development shall cause no increase in flood levels during the
occurrence of the base flood discharge. Prior to issuance of a floodplain
development permit, the applicant must submit a hydrologic and hydraulic
analysis, conducted by a registered professional engineer, demonstrating that
the proposed development would not result in any increase in the base flood
elevation; or

Evidence of such notification must be submitted to the Federal Emergency Management Agency. 3) The applicant shall be responsible for providing the necessary maintenance for the altered or relocated portion of said watercourse so that the flood carrying capacity will not be diminished. The Floodplain Administrator may require the permit holder to enter into an agreement with the City of Riverside specifying the maintenance responsibilities. If an agreement is required, it shall be made a condition of the floodplain development permit. 4) The applicant shall meet the requirements to submit technical data in Section 1113.19.Q.1.a when an alteration of a watercourse results in the relocation or elimination of the special flood hazard area, including the placement of culverts.

#### 1. Requirement to Submit New Technical Data.

- a. For all development proposals that impact floodway delineations or base flood elevations, the community shall ensure that technical data reflecting such changes be submitted to FEMA within six months of the date such information becomes available. These development proposals include:
  - Floodway encroachments that increase or decrease base flood elevations or alter floodway boundaries;
  - Fill sites to be used for the placement of proposed structures where the applicant desires to remove the site from the special flood hazard area;
  - 3) Alteration of watercourses that result in a relocation or elimination of the special flood hazard area, including the placement of culverts; and
  - 4) Subdivision or other new development proposals requiring the establishment of base flood elevations in accordance with Section 1113.19.X3.

b. It is the responsibility of the applicant to have technical data, required in accordance with subsection T.1.a of this section, prepared in a format required for a Conditional Letter of Map Revision or Letter of Map Revision, and submitted to FEMA. Submittal and processing fees for these map revisions shall be the responsibility of the applicant.

- c. The Floodplain Administrator shall require a Conditional Letter of Map Revision prior to the issuance of a floodplain development permit for:
  - 1) Proposed floodway encroachments that increase the base flood elevation; and
  - 2) Proposed development which increases the base flood elevation by more than one foot in riverine areas where FEMA has provided base flood elevations but no floodway.
- d. Floodplain development permits issued by the Floodplain Administrator shall be conditioned upon the applicant obtaining a Letter of Map Revision from FEMA for any development proposal subject to subsection T.1.a of this section.
- 2. Right to Submit New Technical Data. The Floodplain Administrator may request changes to any of the information shown on an effective map that does not impact floodplain or floodway delineations or base flood elevations, such as labeling or planimetric details. Such a submission shall include appropriate supporting documentation made in writing by the City Manager of the City of Riverside and may be submitted at any time.
- 3. Annexation/Detachment. Upon occurrence, the Floodplain Administrator shall notify FEMA in writing whenever the boundaries of the City of Riverside have been modified by annexation or the community has assumed authority over an area, or no longer has authority to adopt and enforce floodplain management regulations for a particular area. In order that the City of Riverside's Flood Insurance Rate Map accurately represents the City of Riverside boundaries, include within such notification a copy of a map of the City of Riverside suitable for reproduction, clearly showing the new corporate limits or the new area for which the City of Riverside has assumed or relinquished floodplain management regulatory authority.
- U. Compliance Required. Data Use and Flood Map Interpretation. The following guidelines shall apply to the use and interpretation of maps and other data showing areas of special flood hazard:
  - No structure or land shall hereafter be located, erected, constructed,
    reconstructed, repaired, extended, converted, enlarged or altered without full
    compliance with the terms of these regulations and all other applicable
    regulations which apply to uses within the jurisdiction of these regulations,

unless specifically exempted from filing for a development permit as stated in Section 1113.19.P. In areas where FEMA has not identified special flood hazard areas, or in FEMA identified special flood hazard areas where base flood elevation and floodway data have not been identified, the Floodplain Administrator shall review and reasonably utilize any other flood hazard data available from a federal, state, or other source.

- 2. Failure to obtain a floodplain development permit shall be a violation of these regulations and shall be punishable in accordance with Section 1103.15 of this UDO. Base flood elevations and floodway boundaries produced on FEMA flood maps and studies shall take precedence over base flood elevations and floodway boundaries by any other source that reflect a reduced floodway width and/or lower base flood elevations. Other sources of data, showing increased, base flood elevations and/or larger floodway areas than are shown on FEMA flood maps and studies, shall be reasonably used by the Floodplain Administrator.
- 3. Floodplain development permits issued on the basis of plans and applications approved by the Floodplain Administrator authorize only the use, and arrangement, set forth in such approved plans and applications or amendments thereto. Use, arrangement, or construction contrary to that authorized shall be deemed a violation of these regulations and punishable in accordance with Section 1103.15 of this UDO. The Floodplain Administrator shall make interpretations, where needed as to the exact location of the flood boundaries and areas of special flood hazard. A person contesting the determination of the location of the boundary shall be given a reasonable opportunity to appeal the interpretation to the Board of Zoning Appeals as provided in Section 1105.17, Appeal Procedure.
- 4. Where an existing or proposed structure or other development is affected by multiple flood zones, by multiple base flood elevations, or both, the development activity must comply with the provisions of this ordinance applicable to the most restrictive flood zone and the highest base flood elevation affecting any part of the existing or proposed structure; or for other developments, affecting any part of the area of the development.
- V. Notice of Violation. Whenever the Floodplain Administrator determines that there has been a violation of any provision of these regulations, he or she shall give notice of such violation to the person responsible therefore and order compliance with these regulations as hereinafter provided. Such notice and order shall: Use of Preliminary Flood Insurance Rate Map and/or Flood Insurance Study Data
  - 1. Be put in writing on an appropriate form; Zone A:

a. Within Zone Aareas designated on an effective FIRM, data from the preliminary FIRM and/or FIS shall be reasonably utilized as best available data.

- b. When all appeals have been resolved and a notice of final flood elevation determination has been provided in a Letter of Final Determination (LFD), BFE and floodway data from the preliminary FIRM and/or FIS shall be used for regulating development.
- 2. Include a list of violations, referring to the section or sections of these regulations that have been violated and order remedial action which, if taken, will effect compliance with the provisions of these regulations; Zones AE, A1-30, AH and AO:
  - a. BFE and floodway data from a preliminary FIS or FIRM restudy are not required to be used in lieu of BFE and floodway data contained in an existing effective FIS and FIRM. However,
    - 1) Where BFEs increase in a restudied area, communities have the responsibility to ensure that new or substantially improved structures are protected. Communities are encouraged to reasonably utilize preliminary FIS or FIRM data in instances where BFEs increase, and floodways are revised to ensure the health, safety, and property of their citizens are protected.
    - 2) Where BFEs decrease, preliminary FIS or FIRM data should not be used to regulate floodplain development until the LFD has been issued or until all appeals have been resolved.
  - b. If a preliminary FIRM or FIS has designated floodways where none had previously existed, communities should reasonably utilize this data in lieu of applying the encroachment performance standard of Section 1113.19.X9.b since the data in the draft or preliminary FIS represents the best data available.
- 3. Specify a reasonable time for performance; Zones B, C and X:
  - a. Use of BFE and floodway date from preliminary FIRM and FIS are not required for areas designated as Zone B C, or Xon the effective FIRM which are being revised to Zone AE, A1-30, AH or AO. Communities are encouraged to reasonably utilize preliminary FIS or FIRM data to ensure that the health, safety, and property of their citizens are protected.
  - Advise the owner, operator, or occupant of the right to appeal.
     Be served on the owner, occupant, or agent in person. However, this

notice and order shall be deemed to be properly served upon the owner,

occupant, or agent if a copy thereof is sent by registered or certified mail to the person's last known mailing address, residence, or place of business, and/or a copy is posted in a conspicuous place in or on the dwelling affected

#### W. Variance Requirements. Substantial Damage Determinations.

- In additional to Section 1105.17, Variance Procedure, the following factors shall be applied: Damages to structures may result from a variety of causes including flood, tornado, wind, heavy snow, fire, etc. After such a damage event, the Floodplain Administrator shall:
  - a. The danger that materials onto other lands to the injury of others. Determine whether damaged structures are located in special flood hazard areas;
  - b. The danger to life and property due to flooding or erosion damage. Conduct substantial damage determinations for damaged structures located in special flood hazard areas; and
  - c. The susceptibility of the proposed facility and its contents to flood damage and the effect of such damage on the individual owner. Require owners of substantially damaged structures to obtain a floodplain development permit prior to repair, rehabilitation, or reconstruction.
  - d. The importance of the services provided by the proposed facility to the community.
  - e. The availability of alternative locations for the proposed use which are not subject to flooding or erosion damage.
  - f. The necessity to the facility of a waterfront location, where applicable.
  - g. The compatibility of the proposed use with existing and anticipated development.
  - h. The relationship of the proposed use to the comprehensive plan and floodplain management program for that area.
  - i. The safety of access to the property in times of flood for ordinary and emergency vehicles.
  - j. The expected heights, velocity, duration, rate of rise, and sediment transport of the flood waters and the effects of wave action, if applicable, expected at the site.
  - k. The costs of providing governmental services during and after flood conditions, including maintenance and repair of public utilities and facilities such as sewer, gas, electrical, and water systems, and streets and bridges.
- 2. A determination that the granting of a variance will not result in increased floodheights beyond that which is allowed in these regulations; additional threats to-

public safety; extraordinary public expense, nuisances, fraud on or victimization or the public, or conflict with existing local laws. Additionally, the Floodplain Administrator may implement other measures to assist with the substantial damage determination and subsequent repair process. These measures include issuing press releases, public service announcements, and other public information materials related to the floodplain development permits and repair of damaged structures; coordinating with other federal, state, and local agencies to assist with substantial damage determinations; providing owners of damaged structures materials and other information related to the proper repair of damaged structures in special flood hazard areas; and assist owners of substantially damaged structures with Increased Cost of Compliance insurance claims.

- 3. A determination that the structure or other development is protected by methods to minimize flood damages.
- X. Use and Development Standards for Flood Hazard Reduction. The following use and development standards apply to development wholly within, partially within, or in contact with any flood hazard area as established in Section 1113.19.D, U.1, or V.
  - 1. Use Regulations.
    - a. *Permitted Uses*. All uses not otherwise prohibited in this section or any other applicable land use regulation adopted by the City of Riverside are allowed provided they meet the provisions of these regulations.
  - 2. Water and Wastewater Systems. The following standards apply to all water supply, sanitary sewerage, and waste disposal systems in the absence of any more restrictive standard provided under the Ohio Revised Code or applicable state rules:
    - a. All new and replacement water supply systems shall be designed to minimize or eliminate infiltration of flood waters into the system;
    - b. New and replacement sanitary sewerage systems shall be designed to minimize or eliminate infiltration of flood waters into the systems and discharge from the system into flood waters; and
    - c. On site waste disposal systems shall be located to avoid impairment to or contamination from them during flooding.
  - 3. Subdivisions and Other New Developments.
    - a. All subdivision proposals and all other proposed new development shall be consistent with the need to minimize flood damage and are subject to all applicable standards in these regulations;
    - b. All subdivision proposals and all other proposed new development shall

- have public utilities and facilities such as sewer, gas, electrical, and water systems located and constructed to minimize flood damage;
- c. All subdivision proposals and all other proposed new development shall have adequate drainage provided to reduce exposure to flood damage; and
- d. In all areas of special flood hazard where base flood elevation data are not available, the applicant shall provide a hydrologic and hydraulic engineering analysis that generates base flood elevations for all subdivision proposals and other proposed developments containing at least 50 lots or five acres, whichever is less.
- e. The applicant shall meet the requirement to submit technical data to FEMA in Section 1113.19.T.1.a.4, when a hydrologic and hydraulic analysis is completed that generates base flood elevations as required by subsection d above.
- 4. Residential Structures. The requirements of Section X4 apply to new construction of residential structures and to substantial improvements of residential structures in zones A, A1-30, AE, AO, and AH, when designated on the community's effective FIRM, and when designated on a preliminary or final FIRM issued by FEMA under the circumstances provided in Section V.
  - a. New construction and substantial improvements shall be anchored to prevent flotation, collapse, or lateral movement of the structure resulting from hydrodynamic and hydrostatic loads, including the effects of buoyancy. Where a structure, including its foundation members, is elevated on fill to or above the base flood elevation, the requirements for anchoring (this subsection X4.and construction materials resistant to flood damage (subsection X4.b below) are satisfied.
  - b. New construction and substantial improvements shall be constructed with methods and materials resistant to flood damage.
  - c. New construction and substantial improvements shall be constructed with electrical, heating, ventilation, plumbing and air conditioning equipment and other services facilities that are designed and/or elevated so as to prevent water from entering or accumulating within the components during conditions of flooding.
  - d. New construction and substantial improvement of any residential structure, including manufactured homes, shall have the lowest floor, including basement, elevated to or above the flood protection elevation. In AO areas with no elevations specified, the structure shall have the lowest floor including basement, elevated at least two feet above the highest adjacent natural grade.
  - e. New construction and substantial improvements, including manufactured

homes that do not have basements and that are elevated to the flood protection elevation using pilings, columns, posts, or solid foundation perimeter walls with openings to allow the automatic equalization of hydrostatic pressure may have an enclosure below the lowest floor provided the enclosure meets the following standards:

- 1) Be used only for the parking of vehicles, building access, or storage; and
- 2) Be designed and certified by a registered professional engineer or architect to automatically equalize hydrostatic flood forces on exterior walls by allowing for the entry and exit of flood waters; or
- 3) Have a minimum of two openings on different walls having a total net area not less than one square inch for every square foot of enclosed area, and the bottom of all such openings being no higher than one foot above grade. The openings may be equipped with screens, louvers, or other coverings or devices provided that they permit the automatic entry and exit of floodwaters.
- f. Manufactured homes shall be affixed to a permanent foundation and anchored to prevent flotation, collapse or lateral movement of the structure resulting from hydrodynamic and hydrostatic loads, including the effects of buoyancy. Methods of anchoring may include, but are not limited to, use of over the top or frame ties to ground anchors.
- g. Repair or rehabilitation of historic structures upon a determination that the proposed repair or rehabilitation will not preclude the structure's continued designation as a historic structure and is the minimum necessary to preserve the historic character and design of the structure, shall be exempt from the development standards of Section X.
- h. In AO and AH Zones, new construction and substantial improvement shall have adequate drainage paths around structures on slopes to guide flood waters around and away from the structure.
- 5. Nonresidential Structures. The requirements of Section X.5 apply to new construction and substantial improvements of nonresidential structures in zones A, A1-30, AE, AO and AH when designated on the community's effective FIRM, and when designated on a preliminary or final FIRM issued by FEMA under the circumstances provided in Section V.
  - a. New construction and substantial improvement of any commercial, industrial, or other nonresidential structure shall meet the requirements of subsection X4.a-c and e-g.
  - b. New construction and substantial improvement of any commercial, industrial,

or other nonresidential structure shall either have the lowest floor, including basement, elevated to or above the level of the flood protection elevation; or, together with attendant utility and sanitary facilities, shall meet all of the following standards:

- Be dry flood proofed so that the structure is watertight with walls substantially impermeable to the passage of water to the level of the flood protection elevation;
- Have structural components capable of resisting hydrostatic and hydrodynamic loads and effects of buoyancy; and
- 3) Be certified by a registered professional engineer or architect, through the use of a Federal Emergency Management Floodproofing Certificate, that the design and methods of construction are in accordance with subsections X.5.b.1) and 2).
- c. In Zone AO areas with no elevations specified, the structure shall have the lowest floor, including basement, elevated at least two feet above the highest adjacent natural grade.
- 6. Accessory Structures. Structures that are 600 square feet or less which are used for parking and storage only are exempt from elevation or dry floodproofing standards within zones A, A1-30, AE, AO and AH designated on the community's FIRM. Such structures must meet the following standards:
  - a. They shall not be used for human habitation;
  - b. They shall be constructed of flood resistant materials;
  - c. They shall be constructed and placed on the lot to offer the minimum resistance to the flow of flood waters:
  - d. They shall be firmly anchored to prevent flotation;
  - e. Service facilities such as electrical and heating equipment shall be elevated or floodproofed to or above the level of the flood protection elevation; and
  - f. They shall meet the opening requirements of subsection X4.e.3).
- 7. Recreational Vehicles. Recreational vehicles on sites within zones A, A1-30, AE, AO and AH must meet at least one of the following standards:
  - a. They shall not be located on sites in special flood hazard areas for more than 180 days, or
  - b. They must be fully licensed and ready for highway use, or
  - c. They must be placed on the site pursuant to a floodplain development permit issued under Sections 1113.19.L, M, and meet all the standards of Section X4.
- 8. Above Ground Gas or Liquid Storage Tanks. Within zone A, A1-30, AE, AO, or AH,

new or substantially improved above ground gas or liquid storage tanks shall be anchored to prevent flotation or lateral movement resulting from hydrodynamic and hydrostatic loads.

- 9. Assurance of Flood Carrying Capacity. Pursuant to the purpose and methods of reducing flood damage stated in these regulations, the following additional standards are adopted to assure that the reduction of the flood carrying capacity of watercourses is minimized:
  - a. Development in Floodways.
    - 1) In floodway areas, development shall cause no increase in flood levels during the occurrence of the base flood discharge. Prior to issuance of a floodplain development permit, the applicant must submit a hydrologic and hydraulic analysis, conducted by a registered professional engineer, demonstrating that the proposed development would not result in any increase in the base flood elevation; or
    - 2) Development in floodway areas causing increases in the base flood elevation may be permitted provided all of the following are completed by the applicant:
      - A) Meet the requirements to submit technical data in Section 1113.19.T.1;
      - B) An evaluation of alternatives which would not result in increased base flood elevations and an explanation why these alternatives are not feasible;
      - C) Certification that no structures are located in areas which would be impacted by the increased base flood elevation;
      - D) Documentation of individual legal notices to all impacted property owners within and outside the community, explaining the impact of the proposed action on their property; and
      - E) Concurrence of the City Manager of the City of Riverside and the Chief Executive Officer of any other communities impacted by the proposed actions.
  - b. Development in Riverine Areas with Base Flood Elevations but No Floodways.
    - 1) In riverine special flood hazard areas identified by FEMA where base flood elevation data are provided but no floodways have been designated, the cumulative effect of any proposed development, when combined with all other existing and anticipated development, shall not increase the base flood elevation more than one foot at any point. Prior to issuance of a floodplain development permit, the applicant must submit a hydrologic and

- hydraulic analysis, conducted by a registered professional engineer, demonstrating that this standard has been met; or
- 2) Development in riverine special flood hazard areas identified by FEMA where base flood elevation data are provided but no floodways have been designated causing more than one foot increase in the base flood elevation may be permitted provided all of the following are completed by the applicant:
  - A) An evaluation of alternatives which would result in an increase of one foot or less of the base flood elevation and an explanation why these alternatives are not feasible;
  - B) Subsection X.9.a.2) above, items A) and C) through E).
- c. Alterations of a Watercourse. For the purpose of these regulations, a watercourse is altered when any change occurs within its banks. The extent of the banks shall be established by a field determination of the "bank full stage" shall be based on methods presented in Chapter 7 of the USDA Forest Service General Technical Report RM 245, Stream Channel Reference Sites: An Illustrated Guide to Field Technique or other applicable publication available from a Federal, State, or other authoritative source. For all proposed developments that alter a watercourse, the following standards apply:
  - 1) The bankfull flood carrying capacity of the altered or relocated portion of the watercourse shall not be diminished. Prior to the issuance of a floodplain development permit, the applicant must submit a description of the extent to which any watercourse will be altered or relocated as a result of the proposed development, and certification by a registered professional engineer that the bankfull flood carrying capacity of the watercourse will not be diminished.
  - 2) Adjacent communities, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, and the Ohio Department of Natural Resources, Division of Water, must be notified prior to any alteration or relocation of a watercourse. Evidence of such notification must be submitted to the Federal Emergency Management Agency.
  - 3) The applicant shall be responsible for providing the necessary maintenance for the altered or relocated portion of said watercourse so that the flood carrying capacity will not be diminished. The Floodplain Administrator may require the permit holder to enter into an agreement with the City of Riverside specifying the maintenance responsibilities. If an agreement is required, it shall be made a

responsibilities. If an agreement is required, it shall be made a

- condition of the floodplain development permit.
- 4) The applicant shall meet the requirements to submit technical data in Section 1113.19.T.1.a when an alteration of a watercourse results in the relocation or elimination of the special flood hazard area, including the placement of culverts.

# Y. Compliance Required.

- 1. No structure or land shall hereafter be located, erected, constructed, reconstructed, repaired, extended, converted, enlarged, or altered without full compliance with the terms of these regulations and all other applicable regulations which apply to uses within the jurisdiction of these regulations, unless specifically exempted from filing for a development permit as stated in Section 113.19.R.
- 2. Failure to obtain a floodplain development permit shall be a violation of these regulations and shall be punishable in accordance with <u>Sections 1103.99</u> and 1331.99 of this UDO.
- 3. Floodplain development permits issued on the basis of plans and applications approved by the Floodplain Administrator authorize only the use, and arrangement, set forth in such approved plans and applications or amendments thereto. Use, arrangement, or construction contrary to that authorized shall be deemed a violation of these regulations and punishable in accordance with Sections 1103.99 and 1331.99 of this UDO.
- Z. Notice of Violation. Whenever the Floodplain Administrator determines that there has been a violation of any provision of these regulations, he or she shall give notice of such violation to the person responsible therefore, and order compliance with these regulations as hereinafter provided. Such notice and order shall:
  - 1. Be put in writing on an appropriate form;
  - 2. Include a list of violations, referring to the section or sections of these regulations that have been violated and order remedial action which, if taken, will effect compliance with the provisions of these regulations;
  - 3. Specify a reasonable time for performance;
  - 4. Advise the owner, operator, or occupant of the right to appeal;
  - 5. Be served on the owner, occupant, or agent in person. However, this notice and order shall be deemed to be properly served upon the owner, occupant, or agent if a copy thereof is sent by registered or certified mail to the person's last known mailing address, residence, or place of business, and/or a copy is posted in a conspicuous place in or on the dwelling affected.

#### AA. Appeals.

1. Any person affected by any notice and order, or other official action of the Floodplain Administrator may request and shall be granted a hearing on the matter before the Board of Zoning Appeals provided that such person shall file, within 10 days of the date of such notice and order, or other official action, a brief statement of the grounds for such hearing or for the mitigation of any item appearing on any order of the Floodplain Administrator's decision per Section 1105.17 of this UDO.

2. Those aggrieved by the decision of the Board of Zoning Appeals may appeal such decision to the Montgomery County Court of Common Pleas, as provided in Chapter 2506 of the Ohio Revised Code.

#### BB. Variance Requirements.

- 1. In addition to <u>Section 1105.15</u>, Variance Procedure, the following factors shall be applied:
  - a. The danger that materials onto other lands to the injury of others.
  - b. The danger to life and property due to flooding or erosion damage.
  - c. The susceptibility of the proposed facility and its contents to flood damage and the effect of such damage on the individual owner.
  - d. The importance of the services provided by the proposed facility to the community.
  - e. The availability of alternative locations for the proposed use which are not subject to flooding or erosion damage.
  - f. The necessity to the facility of a waterfront location, where applicable.
  - g. The compatibility of the proposed use with existing and anticipated development.
  - h. The relationship of the proposed use to the comprehensive plan and floodplain management program for that area.
  - i. The safety of access to the property in times of flood for ordinary and emergency vehicles.
  - j. The expected heights, velocity, duration, rate of rise, and sediment transport of the flood waters and the effects of wave action, if applicable, expected at the site.
  - k. The costs of providing governmental services during and after flood conditions, including maintenance and repair of public utilities and facilities such as sewer, gas, electrical, and water systems, and streets and bridges.
- 2. A showing of good and sufficient cause.
- 3. Adetermination that failure to grant the variance would result in exceptional

hardship due to the physical characteristics of the property. Increased cost or inconvenience of meeting the requirements of these regulations does not constitute an exceptional hardship to the applicant.

- 4. A determination that the granting of a variance will not result in increased flood heights beyond that which is allowed in these regulations; additional threats to public safety; extraordinary public expense, nuisances, fraud on or victimization of the public, or conflict with existing local laws.
- 5. A determination that the structure or other development is protected by methods to minimize flood damages.
- 6. A determination that the variance is the minimum necessary, considering the flood hazard to afford relief.

Upon consideration of the above factors and the purposes of these regulations, the Board of Zoning Appeals may attach such conditions to the granting of the variances, as it deems necessary to further the purposes of these regulations.

#### CC. Other Conditions for Variances

- 1. Variances shall not be issued within any designated floodway if any increase in flood levels during the base flood discharge would result.
- 2. Generally, variances may be issued for new construction and substantial improvements to be erected on a lot of one-half acre or less in size contiguous to surrounded by lots with existing structures constructed below the base flood level, providing items in Section 1113.19.AA.1.a to k have been fully considered. As the lot size increases beyond one-half acre, the technical justification required for issuing a variance increases.
- 3. Any applicant to whom a variance is granted shall be given written notice that the structure will be permitted to be built with a lowest floor elevation below the base flood elevation and the cost of flood insurance will be commensurate with the increased risk resulting from the reduced lowest floor elevation.

#### **EXPLANATION**

As previously discussed with City Council, staff respectfully requests two changes to the Table of Organization as detailed in Exhibit A. First, the amended table adds a Police Officer to account for the addition of a School Resource Officer (SRO) to Police Department operations. Second, the amended table removes the Engineering Technician and adds a Maintenance Worker to the Service Department.

The section addresses situations where someone refuses to pull a permit or pulls one and disregards its requirements but wants to come back repeatedly for additional permits of the same or similar type.

# AN ORDINANCE REVISING CHAPTER 135 AND REPEALING THE EXISTING CHAPTERS 137 AND 149 OF THE ADMINISTRATIVE CODE OF THE CITY OF RIVERSIDE, OHIO.

WHEREAS, Article VI, Section 3 of the City of Riverside Charter grants the City Manager the power to exercise control over all City departments and to recommend to the City Council for adoption such measures as he may deem necessary and expedient; and

WHEREAS, the City Manager has recommended a revision of Chapter 135, repealing Chapters 137 and 149 which have been deemed obsolete after a thorough review, and an adoption of an omnibus fee schedule; and

WHEREAS, the Council of the City of Riverside, Ohio, as the legislative body of the city, has the authority to establish reasonable fees and fines with respect to the administration of the City's building code, zoning and subdivision ordinances, and other codes and regulations; and

WHEREAS, it is City Council's intent to enact an omnibus resolution including all fees for permits, applications and fees and fines under the abovementioned Ordinances, as well as providing for the reimbursement to the City of Riverside for expense incurred in the administration of said ordinances;

WHEREAS, the City of Riverside Administrative Code must be amended to accurately reflect these changes; and

WHEREAS, the Council of the City of Riverside, Ohio has held a public hearing thereon after notice of the time and place thereof had been given as required by law.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF RIVERSIDE, STATE OF OHIO:

- Section 1: That Chapter 135, Permitting and Related Fees, as set forth in Exhibit "A" attached hereto and incorporated herein as is fully set forth is hereby enacted.
- Section 2: That existing Chapter 137, Development and Zoning Fees, and Chapter 149, Planning and Program Management Development, is hereby repealed.
- Section 3: That all other fees established by resolution or ordinance of the City of Riverside not in conflict with this ordinance shall remain as previously adopted. All resolutions or ordinances, or parts of resolutions ordinances conflicting with any provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed and of no force or effect from date this ordinance is enacted.

# CHAPTER 135-ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT DEPARTMENT<sup>1</sup>PERMITTING AND RELATED FEES

#### 135.01 Creation and head. Issuance of permits; fees.

There shall be established a Department of Economic Development, the head of which shall be the Director of Economic Development. The City shall issue permits pursuant to the requirements of the Codified Ordinances and applicable laws, rules, regulations, policies, and procedures. The fees for City-issued permits shall be established in an omnibus resolution approved by the City Council.

(Ord. 15-O-570, Passed 2-19-15)

# 135.02 Director's powers and duties. Revocation or denial of permits.

The Director of Economic Development shall have all the powers and duties now or hereafter given the Director of Economic Development in municipalities by general law and shall have Supervision over and responsibility for the efficient operation of the Department and shall perform such other functions and duties as may be prescribed by Charter, ordinance, resolution, by the Administrative Code or by order of the City Manager. The following are grounds for revocation or denial of any permit application:

- a. The intentional provision of materially misleading information by the applicant (the provision of information is considered "intentional" where the applicant was aware of the inaccuracies or could have discovered the inaccuracies with reasonable diligence);
- b. The failure to comply with any condition of a zoning approval, order, or other applicable law, rule, or regulation;
- c. The subject site, use, applicant, and/or property owner is otherwise not in compliance with provision(s) of City ordinances;
- d. The subject site, use, applicant, and/or property owner is otherwise not in compliance due to incomplete work or projects;
- e. The subject site, use, applicant, and/or property owner is not in compliance due to unperformed, slow to perform work as part of an open permit, or development was not complete in accordance with the approved plan;
- f. The subject site, use, applicant, and/or property owner has outstanding fines from previous and/or ongoing violations of City ordinances.
- g. The subject site, use, applicant, and/or property owner has failed to comply with the terms of a similar permit or the requirement to obtain a similar permit two (2) times within the previous twelve (12) months.

#### 135.03 Director's qualifications and experience. Development review deposit.

The Director of Economic Development shall have such professional qualifications and experience as are determined by the City Manager.

- (a) Collection. Upon the submittal of any plan consisting of a building of more than 1,000 square feet, a subdivision of more than a division of land into two parcels, a site plan review or revision to an existing approved site plan, a proposed Planned Unit Development (PUD) or a revision to an approved PUD, a rezoning or like plan, the City Manager or his/her designee shall ensure that a development review deposit has been collected in an amount prescribed by the City Council.
- (b) Extraordinary deposits. The City Manager may require a development review deposit to be collected or increased when in the sole discretion of the City Manager that the standard development review deposit would be inadequate to preserve the cash flow of the City. An extraordinary development review deposit shall be in multiples of the standard development review deposit.
- (c) Use of funds. The City Manager shall separately track and account for each project requiring a development review deposit. The City Manager shall maintain an inventory of technical and professional development review costs incurred by the City for each project and subtract these costs from the development review deposit. Upon the submittal of any plan consisting of a building of more than 1,000 square feet, a subdivision of more than a division of land into two parcels, a site plan review or revision to an existing approved site plan, a proposed Planned Unit Development (PUD) or a revision to an approved PUD, a rezoning or like plan, the City Manager or his/her designee shall ensure that a review deposit of two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00) has been collected and a separate project account has been established with the Director of Finance for the reimbursement of City expenses paid to consultants employed by the City for the provision of technical and professional services in related project review(s).
- (b) Extraordinary deposits. The City Manager may require a development review deposit to be collected or increased when in the sole discretion of the City Manager that the standard development review deposit would be inadequate to preserve the cash flow of the City. An extraordinary development review deposit

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- shall be in multiples of the standard development review deposit not to exceed any initial deposit of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00).
- (c) Additional payments to the deposit. Each month after payments have been made to the consultants employed by the City to assist in the development review process and the City has been reimbursed its cost from the funds on deposit with said City for development review, the Director of Finance shall submit to a development project owner/representative an invoice for the amount(s) necessary to return the development review deposit project account to its required balance as a revolving fund for the reimbursement of actual paid consultant services used in the review of a development project.
- (d) Approvals subject to payment of the cost. Development related approvals granted by the City by its Planning Commission and/or its Council are not final until all related development review costs have been invoiced to the project owner/representative and received by the Director of Finance.
- (e) Return of unused deposits. Any portion of the funds placed on deposit or additional payments made to the City for a development review deposit for augmentation remaining after all invoices from consultants have been received, and related payments have been made by the City shall be refunded to the project owner/representative.
